The house was of two stories, the lower having five rooms - the Hall, Parlour, Ground Parlour, Kitchen and Store Chamber and the upper three sleeping rooms, the Hall Chamber, the Middle or Stearhead Chamber and the Maidens Chamber, together with an Out Chamber where the servants slept. The ground Parlour was used for sleeping in 1637.

This would have been erected by his son Sir John (3) within two or three years of the death in 1725.

Sir John (3) died on 23.6.1743 in the Kings Bench Prison.
