SHIRI-UNIFORM COMMITTEE REPORT

34 questionnaires answered:

Votes Against Uniforms some sort	5
Notes programming the red shirts in future performances	24
Notes against	3

(only 27 answered this question)

As a committee we could not make a definite decision in regards to funds for new uniforms. Twenty-five members said they would be willing to spend money, but some qualified this in regard to the amount and type of uniform they would be willing to spend money on.

Recommendations of The Committee:

We recommend that the executive committee make the decision when to wear the red shirts with the conditions that the group know at least a week in advance, preferably via the newsletter and with the option that the group as a whole can veto such a decision.

We also recommend that when we receive the crests that they be sewn on the left breast pocket area of the red shirts. This will eliminate any discrepancies as to when to wear the crests and on what.

In addition to be considered for the standard:

Girls: - same style navy blue skirt or dress pants, plus the same style slippers, v-neck sweater vests - in blue (to be worn with the red shirt.)

Boys: - dark grey slacks, same sweater vests as the girls (no decisive decision since age not adequately represented)

Also in connection with a formal performance that a choiced style of short dress in cooridinating colours such as blue dress - red yoke or red dress - blue yoke.

A further suggestion was made to put on a variety show or fashion show in combination with a concert to raise money to a used exclusive, or the procuring of uniforms on the assumption that we do not yet sponsor.



This summer, Alison worked as a helper at the Hermitage Club in Niagara.
