## Cornwall Weekend

Jan. 17-18

Saw most of the group at the Cultural Centre roughly around 9:30 and once Andy's drums were loaded on the bus we were off to Ontario. We left the Centre about 10:00 with a total group numbering 28 people and 29 if you count Roger. Sheldon brought his car along so that he could leave very quickly after the church service so that he could get home to watch the Super Bowl on the television.

The trip down was rather uneventful with people either doing what comes natural to quite a few humans—sleeping or else they were talking or listening to the music that Roger provided by the radio on the bus.

We arrived around 11:30 and after attempting the parking lot once we made it on the second try. The equipment was very quickly put in

Lewis Hall for it was awful nippy standing outside waiting for equipment to be unloaded from the bus. After that frosty chore was completed, eating was the next thing on the list. The meals were bought at a restaurant across the street from the famous King George Hotel and orders ranged from take-out french fries for Serge to Colossal Club Sandwiches and a banana split for Peter to roast pigeon for Dave and Launa.

After we had help to pay for the restaurant staff's salary some of the group went to browse the local stores for any kind of a bargain while others went back to the church to set up quarters for the weekend. The rest of the afternoon passed without too much of anything at all happening except for the Cornwall Violin Association down in the basement and a group practice in Lewis Hall.

Supper came at 5:30 with a meal that was meant for a king set out in front of us. The ladies of the church prepared the meal for us and we very royally stuffed ourselves. After that was accomplished, once again not much was done until the show at 8:00. There was one major drawback for the cigarette smokers in the group, they had to go outside to have a cigarette because of a law from the Fire Marshall's Dept. that said that smoking was not allowed in the building. The 8:00 o'clock show was a coffeehouse affair and there were roughly 100 young people from the church and Cornwall itself in attendance. The highpoint of the evening, as far as Bob was concerned, was when we got a majority of the people up with us to sing a few songs. The show lasted until almost 10:00 and then after some of the group went out to our favourite restaurant for some coffee while others who were not so brave to battle the cold breezes, stayed in the warmth of the church and listened to Serge and Sheldon on the guitars in the church itself where the equipment had been moved to after the show in Lewis Hall had been completed. Some of the young people had stayed behind to listen to Serge as well, and two extra large all dressed pizzas were delivered to the church at midnight and were evenly distributed amongst us. The funny part of the mini concert given by Serge was that Roger curled up in one of the pews and went to sleep in the midst of all that noise, and at 1:00 A.M. when quiet time was set, he woke up because of the lack of noise. Anyway, I think, he found a place to sleep in Lewis Hall.
